WORLD SERVICE CONFERENCE HIGHLIGHTS FROM OUR OREGON AREA DELEGATE

Greetings from **YOUR** Oregon Panel 50 Delegate who was honored to be a part of the 50th anniversary of the World Service Conference (WSC), where delegates from throughout the U.S., trustees, executive committee and World Service Office (WSO) staff gather annually to represent the largest group conscience in Al-Anon. It is almost impossible to convey in a short article the spiritual nature of the conference that is expressed through the conduct of Al-Anon business at the WSC, but a few highlights are summarized here.

Sunday, April 10, although not a part of the actual conference, was a full day with new delegate orientation in the morning and participation in my assigned "Thought Force" on how to include dual members in service work while maintaining our policies in the afternoon. This was followed by a "Sharing Area Highlights" session with a one-minute highlight report from each of the 67 delegates in attendance. The evening dinner included commemorating 50 years of the WSC and pinning of the new delegates. I'll be showing a slide show at the July Assembly that includes pictures.

Monday morning began with a WSC orientation where we reviewed the role of the Conference and the roles

of various Conference members. We were reminded to pray for the guidance of our Higher Power as we seek to practice Al-Anon principles in an ever-changing environment, followed by a review of the four essential elements of the Knowledge Based Decision Making (KBDM) process to an informed group conscience:

- Open communication between leadership and membership
- Dialogue before deliberation
- All decision makers will have common access to full information
- We exist in a culture of trust

We were also reminded that an informed group conscience cannot happen in a vacuum, the links of service must be operating as they were intended to.

Diversity was a theme of many conversations throughout the week, beginning with a presentation on cultural diversity by John Colon, an academic lecturer from Stony Brook University in New York, who addressed various facets of diversity. He noted that even the U.S. constitution had to be amended to include a diverse population. He also noted that when reaching out to others we need to look for individuals

that can stay connected to other people, who are optimistic, spiritual and have an attitude of resilience versus negativity. The conversation continued among the WSC membership over the next several days in the form of leadership workshops on Diversity-Understanding Ourselves and Others and Responsibility as a Conference Member to Expand Our Circle of Hope.

The history of the WSC, beginning in 1961, was reviewed followed by the annual "Big Question" – "What spiritual growth can the fellowship celebrate as a result of 50 years of its informed group conscience as expressed through the WSC?"

We were informed that 16 Together Empowering Al-Anon Members (T.E.A.M.) events were scheduled as of April 2010 and we participated in a presentation on T.E.A.M. events to answer questions that have arisen regarding planning T.E.A.M. events.

As part of the budget report, the Finance Chairman reminded us that the goal for this year for contributions is \$1,500,000 and that we can attain this goal if each member gives \$1.80 more than they did last year.

WORLD SERVICE CONFERENCE HIGHLIGHTS

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The average annual cost of services that the WSO provides to each group is \$240.60. In Oregon in 2009, 72.2% of groups contributed an average of \$91.96 per group.

During the Open Policy meeting, the Policy Committee was asked the question: "Should the WSO maintain a "Do Not Refer" listing for its toll-free meeting line?" This issue has been of great concern to areas where meetings exist that fail to follow the Al-Anon principles and Traditions. A lively discussion was held and it was emphasized that the discussion was **not** about delisting meetings because

the WSO does not delist meetings. There will be a floor discussion on this item at the 2011 WSC.

13 motions were discussed at length and voted on and I will review those at the June Area World Service Committee Meeting (AWSC).

Throughout the week we were reminded of the WSC theme "Celebrate! - Embrace the Group Conscience to Expand Our Circle of Hope." We were asked "does the word celebrate lift the veil of seriousness that so many of us wear?" And we were reminded to work together, play together, and enjoy each other's

company on the path to an informed group conscience.

There is much more to share about the 2010 WSC and if you have never attended an area business meeting or if it has been some time since you last attended, please accept this invitation to join us at the AWSC June meeting to be held in Brownsville on June 19 or the Area Assembly to be held on July 17-18 in Gresham. - Finally, members are exploring a project to get Public Service announcements inside the local mass transit (buses) in Salem – the Cherriots. Our goal is better “brand recognition” for Al-Anon Family Groups (AFG) and for current contact information to get out – for people to know who we are, what we do, and how to reach us.

ACTION COMMITTEES

What is an Action Committee? Has your group representative (GR) been reporting to your group what our Oregon Area Action Committees are working on? Have you as a member been participating in the goals for the Area Al-Anon Action Committee? Ask yourself - do I know what an Action Committee is?

Action Committees are groups of members working together to strengthen Al-Anon and carry our message of hope. All GRs are assigned to an Action Committee. Action Committees meet at assemblies to brainstorm ideas and some may do business online.

In Oregon we have five Actions Committees: Group Services, Membership Outreach, Fellowship Communication, Public Outreach and Business Services.

Every district needs to be sure to have at least one GR on each of the Action Committees. This ensures that there is follow through from the area to the district and to the groups and members. It is the responsibility of each district representative (DR) to ensure communication about Action Committees through the links of service.

ACTION COMMITTEE GOALS:

GROUP SERVICES: Group Records, Archives and Alateen are part of this Action Committee. Archives is working to have a history of all 210 Oregon meetings and they are discussing document storage. The Committee is also encouraging Alateen sponsorship. Helen, our

Group Records Coordinator, is doing a great job keeping our CMAs (current mailing address) up-to-date, but the bottom line is it is up to the GRs and DRs to routinely check information on printouts and the Oregon Area web site. Changes go first to the DR and then on to Group Records.

MEMBERSHIP OUTREACH: The big topic here is our Oregon Area newsletter, the *COMMUNICATOR*. Is it prudent to mail the newsletter to all groups? How many copies do we mail? Should the groups assume the responsibility and download their own copies from the web site? Is the *COMMUNICATOR* about only service or should it contain personal sharings?? Has your GR asked you what you want your Area newsletter to contain?

FELLOWSHIP COMMUNICATION: Increasing Forum subscriptions and using our literature more in meetings is what they are working on.

PUBLIC OUTREACH: To inform the public and our fellowship about the Lois W. story on public television was a goal. Now to get the Al-Anon message out to the public will be the big focus.

BUSINESS SERVICES: This committee audits our books, works on our budget and discusses area financial issues.

The Portland Al-Anon Information Service (AIS) Media Chair, Karen, gave me so much support. She made many phone calls and sent out press releases to all the local newspapers and television stations. District 7 was way ahead of me in getting out the information to

ALTERNATE DELEGATE REPORT

The Alternate Delegates responsibilities include three areas. My report may seem long – but hopefully you'll understand and find enjoyment by the end.

As Alternate Delegate, I am suppose to support our Delegate in any form that I can. I have failed in my 1st attempt. I apologize to Bette, our Delegate, to the Group Membership Services Action Committee and to all of you. I was charged with mailing 100 of our new group representative books to Bette at the World Service Conference. I couldn't have them there before April 1st and hopefully no later than April 11th. I had them boxed and ready to go. I placed them in my car for April 1st to come around. I remembered they were suppose to have been in Virginia on April 15th, tax day. I'm really sorry. This kind of behavior is not normal for me and I sincerely apologize for dropping the ball.

Another of my Alternate Delegate duties is to oversee the Oregon Area Handbook. It has come to my attention (by going through it), that we are in conflict with what our handbook says in response to Motions and conducting business. Oregon Area has chosen to create and follow the Oregon Area Handbook in areas where there are differences with the World Service Office Service Manual. Our handbook states that we operate under Robert's Rules. We have been working under the premise of KBDM (Knowledge Based Decision Making) for the last 3 years. I make a proposal that we do KBDM around using KBDM in the Oregon Area. For this I suggest we need an ad-hoc committee appointed by our Chairperson.

When I stood for this position, I remember saying I believed part of the Alternate Delegate's job was to be the Area Alateen Process Person (AAPP) and that would require attention to detail and the ability to be organized and a good communicator with our fellowship. I said that based on reading the job description and talking with our previous Alternate Delegate. I'm here to tell you, our description in the Oregon Area Handbook was pretty darn accurate!

The first six months have been filled with creating an excel database with all of our current and previous Alateen meetings information listed and entering all the current and previous Alateen Sponsor candidates information. This was a necessity for me with the many requests I received for "who is approved as a sponsor and who has not gotten their fingerprints approved yet?" We have added one new Alateen meeting in the Phoenix area, District 7. There have been XXX new AI-Anon members applying to be sponsors. I have a medium load of communication going back and forth between district representatives, Alateen Coordinators and Alateen Sponsor Candidates and the World Service Office. I have found four areas with eight things we could change to help make our process easier to implement for all of our members, including me. These are:

1. Education

1. Our district representatives (as a whole) don't know all they need to to do their job
2. Our Alateen Coordinators and district representatives sometimes overlap in doing parts of the process
3. Our website is confusing by not having all of the information in one area
2. Process Clarification
 1. Website information
 2. Workshops
3. Re-examining our process (which is recommended by the World Service Office)
 1. Two issues arising but not needing follow through at this time
 2. Ad-hoc committee formed by our Chairperson
4. Re-certification Process
 1. Workshop

My budget needed to be increased a small amount to allow me to mail communication and forms to district representatives and Alateen Coordinators. The Oregon State Police and the World Service Office mail notifications of information, so I have chosen to mail notifications as well. I am also emailing everyone involved as well.

According to previous AAPPs, the paperwork has been passed to each Alternate Delegate in stacks of paper. I propose either shredding the paperwork once it has been completed or purchasing a carry box to store it in. This decision, in my opinion, needs to be evaluated by an ad-hoc committee and voted on by at least the AI-Anon World Service Committee (AWSC).

To conclude, I have 3 proposals:

- 1) Ad-hoc committee for Alateen
- 2) Ad-hoc committee for KBDM on using KBDM
- 3) File for Alateen paperwork – size based on the decision of the ad-hoc committee's recommendation

As you can see, I have been busy. I've had a wonderful opportunity to visit with many of our members. It allows me to use my program and receive love and understanding in many areas.
